When he wasn't out on an adventure, he enjoyed kicking back in his lazy boy chair, arms behind his head with a huge, contented smile. He loved attending Jewish holiday events with friends and family.

Over the years, many people became "Jordan experts." Perfecting his care to a fine science. It was a great combination of attention to his medical needs and at the same time, ensuring he had a strong quality of life.

# My First Six Months at Tamir



Some families reported that they were unable to find camps for their children and Tamir's summer camp was able to fulfill a strong need within the community. Our camp days were jam packed with field trips, crafts, swimming, and so much more! One of our campers told us that "this camp was the best camp he had ever been to!" Others expressed their enjoyment by engaging in the diverse activities provided by a dedicated team of integration aides.

It was amazing to see the tremendous growth in the kids and the positive impact this summer camp has had on families. Through the camp, we supported 16 children with varying needs and abilities. The beauty of this program was our ability to cater to each child's specific needs with our small ratios and devoted integration aids.

We are excited to continue to run the camp for many more years to come!

As the summer wraps up, we are gearing up for an exciting set of fall programming! In addition to 4 after-school clubs (The Art Guild, Coding Club, Baking Club, and Lego Club) our Sunday respite programs will be returning this October.! Highlights from our Sunday programming included field trips across Ottawa, art projects, and the friendships created amongst the children and integration aides.

• The Art Guild will be running on Tuesday evenings from 4:30pm-6pm for 7-10-year-olds and 6:30pm-8pm for 11-15-year-olds. It's a great way to socialize with peers while working on various art projects!



- The Coding Club will be running on Wednesday evenings from 4:30pm-6pm for 7-10-year-olds and 6:30pm-8pm for 11-15-year-olds. Our coding club provides an opportunity for kids to learn how to code from a coding expert!
- The Baking club will be running on Monday evenings from 4:30pm-6pm for 7-10-year-olds and 6:30pm-8pm for 11-15-year-olds. Every week the baking club will try out new recipes and enjoy a meal together!
- Lastly, our Lego club will be running on Thursdays from 4:30pm-6pm for 7-10-year-olds and 6:30pm-8pm for 11-15-year-olds. Lego club will give an opportunity for children to learn how to build Lego sets and how to work collaboratively with peers. Registration is now open for fall programming.

This past summer, Keshet Community Connections welcomed twelve campers to the inclusion program. Children were enrolled in various recreational camps across the city that included: YMCA Orleans, Barrhaven Super 7, Pedalheads Bicycle Camp, Nepean Sportsplex, Jewish Community Campus and others. The support provided for each child by the Integration Aides allowed the opportunity for our kiddos to participate to their fullest potential within an inclusive environment, at a pace that was just right for them.

In consultation with Tamir's Clinical Supervisor, Sunbul Rai at the onset, camp goals for campers were established by parents and Integration Aides supported the goal progress. The objective was that the identified goals would be carried over into the school term. Examples of goals included: focusing on activities/tasks, patience, working on verbalizations (communication), playing with kids their own age (developmental age) and of course having a good time at camp.

# Perfect Timing to Start at Tamir

osh Hashanah is a great opportunity for introspection and a new beginning. I know this first hand as my family and I are privileged to start a new and exciting chapter of our life in Canada.

My name is Nir Koren. I'm married to my wife Andy and I'm the father of five children. I am a lawyer and have a master's degree in Educational Institutions Management. For the last fourteen years I have served as a community rabbi in various countries: Mexico, Colombia and Ecuador.

Working at the Tamir Foundation is an opportunity for me to return to my roots and my childhood. From the age of fourteen to twentyeight I served in several institutions and organizations dedicated to the integration of people with different abilities in the Israeli society. During that time I got to know the complex world in which we live and the difficulties we face as a society in our search for equality. The discourse we hear most often is about doing kindness and helping those who want to integrate, but in fact what we are trying to achieve is basic respect and equal opportunities for all, to which we are all entitled.

The problem is not a specific person with the limitation, because we all suffer from different limitations. For example, I have very limited abilities with technology. Other people struggle to express themselves, and there are others with physical conditions that make them "different." After all, our world was founded on the value of diversity. It is precisely the combination of different shades that create the spectacular rainbow of colors that make up the human race, and Judaism in particular.

Our sages debated the question of what was created on Rosh Hashanah, the world or man. But in fact, as the Gemara points out, God created a single person to teach us that each person is a whole world and those who save one soul in Israel are rescuing a whole world.

In order to achieve change, there is no need to make big revolutions, rather, behave the same with everyone: smile, give an

opportunity, show interest, and allow presence in the community space. This is all that is needed to change the life of one person, their family and their community immediately.

Like circles in water, one person sends ripples far and the circles of goodness reach much further from the place of change. May we all have a happy and sweet new year. A year of happiness, blessing, success, a year in which we will be able to give people who need it an opportunity for equality. If we only remember that the same things we ask God for ourselves can easily be given to others.
